## **Chairmans Annual Parish Report - 2018**

Another year passes and Winsham — our wonderful, small rural parish continues to operate above the national trends and prove it is a 'wonderful place to live'. Despite it's relatively small population we still have a pre-school, a primary school, a community shop, a post office, a pub, a sports & social club, and a thriving and up to date community hall. We have an award-winning Parish Council. I'd like to think we set the bar that other councils look to follow, but all we are doing is following 'good practice'. We look especially to the National Association of Local Councils (NALC) and the guidelines they lay down in their local government award scheme.

Last year, the Parish Council received the prestigious "Foundation" award as part of the Local Council Award Scheme from NALC. This achievement recognised that the council achieves good practice in governance, community engagement and council improvement. Moreover, that the Parish Council goes above and beyond their legal obligations, leading their communities and continuously seeking opportunities to improve and develop even further.

So how did we get here? Well, thanks mostly to the Localism Act, which is an Act of Parliament that changes the powers of local government in England. The aim of the act is to facilitate the devolution of decision-making powers from central government control to individuals and communities, including what's known as "general power of competence" which states "a local authority has power to do anything that individuals generally may do".

Let's demonstrate what is meant by that by comparing April 2010 parish council agenda with that of April 2018. Admittedly this is purely a visual demonstration and doesn't reflect the amount of time the individual items took to discuss – but it does show, we hope, the changes in amount of work done in the intervening eight years:

It's worth noting the number of parish councillors hasn't changed – there are still nine seats to be filled! In the past year we've had 241 agenda items at the Parish Council – that's an average of 20 items per month.

We've achieved so much over the past couple of years – we now have comprehensive sets of policies and strategies, we have brought much needed order to the cemetery, we've tidied up most of the main assets in the village, in the wider parish the footpaths on the whole are mostly in good nick, we now have a news outlet, we are online with an impressive website, we offer our parishioners chances to have their say in many consultations that affect public life, we offer opportunities to people for training on computers to health & wellness checks, we've brought extra income into the parish, we replaced the trip hazard paving stones under the Church Street lych gate after 80 years of much wear and tear, we've had to cope with & replace a loss of a central government grant and create a depreciation strategy for our assets, we've undertaken a much needed housing needs survey, we've been more generous with grants than any other council I can see in our history, we have committed to a 4 year financial plan in which we will not put up our cemetery or allotment fees, we now have meetings every single month of the year, we also have informal 'meet your councillor' surgeries for those unable to make traditional meetings and prefer less formality, and we have yearly action plans for what to focus on in terms of our activities. We have at the very least 20 items of business every month – we are a council that does a lot, has achieved a lot - and, yes still has much to do! And finally, to get the first stamp of approval from the National Association of Local Councils in the form of Foundation was truly the icing on the cake. We should all be very proud of our achievements.

So what's to come? We still don't have an emergency plan! We need to refresh our parish plan after 5 years, because if you look back know you'll see not only is it dated, we've also completed quite a lot of it! But the question is - what is important to you now? What should we prioritise our action to? People have migrated to and from Winsham, so it's time we ask the questions again. The plan is to undertake this work in a couple of months time, heading into the autumnal months. Also coming later in 2018 will be some form of commemorations marking 100 years since the end of the Great War. This will be preceded by a cleaning of the Winsham & Cricket St. Thomas War Memorial. Further information will be released over the coming months.

May we congratulate Marjorie Fowler on her Community Service Award. Her recognition comes from votes sent in by 11% of the parish population is a stunning number, by any stretch of the imagination. A plaque noting the gratitude of the people will be added to the Jubilee Hall by kind permission of the Hall Committee, and Marj gets to spend some well-deserved money in The Bell Inn at her convenience.

It's also very important that we put on to record both our acknowledgement and gratitude to the contribution of the many volunteers who run and support the all of the activities and organisations in the parish. Without you, none of 'Winsham being Winsham' would be possible – so thank you!

The work of the Parish Council is never done, but it does continue apace. Please remember to keep your eye on the media outlets for the parish for updates and news, and to get in touch with the Clerk (in the first instance) if you have any ideas, suggestions or comments.


As Charles Dickens once wrote, "The pain of parting is nothing to the joy of meeting again". So here's to May 2019, and thank you for your time in reading this report.
