Residents, crews save the day

This summer has, so far, included extreme temperatures, vehicle breakdowns, driver shortages and vandalism of refuse trucks. Thanks to hard working staff and helpful residents – including many offering cool drinks in hot weather to crews – missed collections were kept to a minimum.

Your rubbish bin revealed

As part of our preparations for Recycle More, experts have carried out a composition analysis of Somerset's rubbish and monitored participation in recycling (anonymously, of course). Results show that although 85% of residents actively recycle on a regular basis, 26% of the average refuse bin, by weight, is still food waste. Materials that currently can and should go in a recycling box, including paper, cans, cardboard, plastic bottles, textiles, and glass bottles and jars, make up 17%, and another 9% is garden waste that should be either composted at home or collected via the garden waste service.

The analysis also assessed the contents of refuse bins by volume. It found that well over half of the contents of our rubbish bins should not be there. An interesting finding of the research is that the average Somerset wheeled bin is not completely full after two weeks. This surplus capacity, together with plans to introduce expanded weekly recycling collections, including plastic pots, tubs and trays, and Tetra Paks, means we are confident that residents will manage the change to three-weekly refuse collections rolling out from 2020.

Plastics rush to recycling sites

All 16 recycling sites have seen a rush to bring in the food and household plastic pots, tubs and trays now taken. Demand has been so high that dumpy bags and other containers sometimes have to be used to hold those extra items – but rest assured that will all be taken to Viridor's plastics reprocessing facility in Kent.

Landfill diversion exercise

Working with our contractors, SWP is running an exercise at the Highbridge and Yeovil recycling centres until 31 October to explore what and how much unrecyclable waste currently taken to recycling sites is suitable for disposal by the Resource Recovery Centre (RRC) being built by Viridor at Avonmouth. Residents taking non-recyclable waste to these sites will be directed to one of two designated skips, depending on the type of material they have brought in.

Permit or licence? Always check

SWP is reminding residents that the <u>permits</u> required for vans and trailers to access the network of local recycling sites are **not** waste carrier licences.

SWP introduced the permit scheme in 2016 to help cut congestion and trade waste abuse by allowing only Somerset residents to bring in their household waste with a van or car-towed trailer. Waste carrier licences are required by law if you transport waste, or are a waste broker or dealer.

If you are paying for your waste to be removed, the advice to stop it being flytipped is simple: never pay cash or use social media; get a receipt, check the waste carrier licence and a copy of the waste transfer note; and always keep notes of names, phone contacts and vehicle registration numbers. Stop that barbecue bin blaze

And with the weather encouraging al fresco meals and more, SWP has explained that metal kitchenware, large catering-sized metal containers or tins for biscuits and sweets, and five-litre beer kegs cannot be accepted at the kerbside and should be taken to any recycling site for recycling.
